OMNIBUS SURVEY



PURPOSE

- To evaluate community's perceptions on issues relating to: crime, drug prevalence, and overall health
- Common issues for Bermuda's residents in recent years.

Representative sample survey of 400 residents across the entire Island.

Commissioned 4 questions in the 2nd Quarter 2024 Omnibus Survey.

Residents were asked about:

how safe they felt in their own neighborhood?



how their current feelings of safety compared to those from six months ago?



what types of crime they knew to have occurred in their neighborhood in the past year?



how they would rate their own health?



TREATMENT DEMAND INDICATORS



Administered continuously from 2011 to present; personal interview.

Purpose

- Used as a surveillance tool to monitor drug trends and identify emerging issues.
- -Primary drug of impact
- -Drug prices

- Each client presenting for treatment, whether admitted or not (preadmission and admission).

Client Profile

Thirteen clients participated in the survey.

The majority of clients underwent treatment for 1 to 2

The clients ranged in age from 41 to 65 years old.

Most clients reported their educational level as B.S.S.C/GED.

Service Responsiveness

Just over half of the clients expressed their satisfaction with the prompt assistance provided by the administrative staff. Clients feit they were able to receive the treatment they needed when required. Clients acknowledged that there was an adequate number of staff members available to meet their needs, and that general service times were ok.

informed Choice

in determining their treatment goals, and agreed that the provided materials were easy to comprehend.

Respect

Clients confirmed that the individuals at RLH respected them as people and showed them courtesy, with most expressing that their privacy was respected.

Clients reported that information is only given to people of their choosing.

Participation

Majority of clients confirmed they know where/how to get help in the community, as well as agreeing that they will be able to find employment upon completion of their treatment. Clients felt that they can accomplish tasks without encountering barriers.

Overall Value

provided with alternative options, client would still choose to come to RLH, and would recommend RLH to a friend.

Clients were satisfied with the activities provided by RLH.






EMPLOYEE CLIMATE SURVEY

2023-2024 DRUG ABUSE MONITORING SURVEY

- Drug Abuse Monitoring Survey was conducted from May 1st, 2023 to April 30th, 2024 in collaboration with Department of Corrections
- Purpose:
 - Surveillance of drug use among high risk populations
 - Severity of substance use: drug of choice and length of use (those who require substance abuse treatment)
 - Gauge drug consumption and criminality
 - Highlights types of crimes committed by substances users
- Population:
 - Inmate population at Westgate and Co-ED facilities
 - Surveys are voluntary (Refusal:26 and Released before taking survey:21) (Response rate: 72.5%)
 - Urine screens test for 12 substances (new: morphine)
- Administered every 2 years. (last completed in 2017)





23/24 DRUG ABUSE MONITORING SURVEY

DATA COLLECTION

(May 1st, 2023 - April 30th, 2024)

INMATES arrive at WCF & Co-Ed



PROGRAMME DIRECTOR



DNDC

- Processed by Specialist Officer (Nurse)
- Urine samples obtained and tested
- Results forwarded to Senior Nursing Officer who forwards them to The DNDC

- Is notified when admission clears COVID
 19 Quarantine
- Notifies assigned interviewer
- Receives completed surveys from the interviewers to forward to the DNDC.

- Dispenses urine kits and questionnaires as needed
- Receives completed questionnaires
- Enters into database
- Analyses data and reports survey findings

INTERVIEWERS

- Interviews inmate within 48 hours of their clearing COVID 19 Quarantine.
- Verifies survey information and provides the completed questionnaire to the Programme Director







12.3% used prescribed medication for mental/emotional problems in the past year.




Figure 3.1. Prescribed medication for mental or emotional problems in the past year.




Figure 3.2. Substance abuse treatment and counseling.

Current and Previous Offence: 23.9% Drugs




Figure 4.1. Number of Times in Prison Excluding Current Imprisonment by Proportion of Respondents.

HIV & AIDS HEPATITIS B STATUS & ABUSE HISTORY

HIV/AIDS & Hepatitis

- Majority of participants were not HIV positive (95.0%) and did not have Hepatitis B (97.0%).
- 4 inmates reported being HIV positive

 Physical Abuse & Neglect: 12.3% by age 18 years.




Figure 7.1. Drug market in past year and month.

Prior to their current arrests and incarceration:

No substance abuse problems: 29.0%

Low substance abuse problems: 24.6%

Intermediate to severe drug abuse problems: 14.5%

Roughly 1 in 7 inmates, requires some form of support or intervention for substance abuse issues.



GANG INVOLVEMENT

- 10.1% admitted to having friends or family members belonging to a gang.
- 1.4% of respondents admitted to belonging to a gang themselves.




Figure 9.1. Gang involvement of self or family/friends.
